Greetings from Friendswood, TX

It's that time of the year again, when we here in Texas, think about closing the windows at night. This past year has brought us both losses and travels. Winston's Grandfather and Aunt both passed away this summer, and they are sorely missed. Funerals are mixed blessings; they occur because of a loss, but they also bring family together and allow for reflections on life. We're thankful for the time and experiences we have shared.

Megan is now 3.5 years old, she's telling stories, expressing opinions, and getting bigger. She loves going on walks and hikes and catching bugs. Julie continues to devote all her time to Megan, and they spend all week going to all the different programs offered by the Armand Bayou Nature Center as well as the Clear Lake Library. They really enjoy walking the nature trails and checking out books. Winston was awarded "Mid-Career Boeing Engineer of the Year Award for the Houston Site." In March we spent the first day of spring driving around Galveston Bay from sunrise over the Gulf of Mexico to finish at the Anahuac National Wildlife Refuge where we watched a pair of Black necked stilts mate.
